EUROPEAN MARITIME EMPIRES AND EXPANSION

THE TREATY OF Tordesillas IN 1494 DIVIDED NEW LANDS BETWEEN SPAIN AND PORTUGAL, REFLECTING THEIR DOMINANT ROLES IN EARLY COLONIAL EXPANSION. THESE EXPLORATIONS RESULTED IN THE DISCOVERY OF NEW RESOURCES AND A DRAMATIC INCREASE IN WEALTH FOR EUROPE.

ENGLISH, FRENCH, AND DUTCH COLONIAL VENTURES

ENGLAND, FRANCE, AND THE NETHERLANDS ENTERED THE RACE FOR COLONIES SOMEWHAT LATER BUT QUICKLY ESTABLISHED SIGNIFICANT PRESENCES IN NORTH AMERICA, THE CARIBBEAN, AND PARTS OF ASIA. THE ENGLISH FOUNDED JAMESTOWN IN 1607 AND LATER EXPANDED INTO THE THIRTEEN COLONIES, WHILE THE FRENCH COLONIZED PARTS OF CANADA AND THE CARIBBEAN ISLANDS. THE DUTCH CREATED A POWERFUL TRADING EMPIRE WITH THE DUTCH EAST INDIA COMPANY, CONTROLLING KEY PORTS AND TRADE ROUTES IN SOUTHEAST ASIA.

THE COLUMBIAN EXCHANGE AND GLOBAL INTERACTION

THE COLUMBIAN EXCHANGE REFERS TO THE WIDESPREAD TRANSFER OF PLANTS, ANIMALS, PEOPLES, CULTURE, TECHNOLOGY, DISEASES, AND IDEAS BETWEEN THE AMERICAS, WEST AFRICA, AND THE OLD WORLD FOLLOWING COLUMBUS'S VOYAGES. THIS EXCHANGE HAD PROFOUND AND LONG-LASTING EFFECTS ON THE GLOBAL POPULATION, AGRICULTURE, AND ECOLOGY, WHICH CHAPTER 18 AP WORLD HISTORY COVERS EXTENSIVELY.

BIOLOGICAL AND AGRICULTURAL EXCHANGES

ECONOMIC SYSTEMS AND MERCANTILISM

COLONIES WERE OFTEN RESTRICTED FROM TRADING WITH OTHER NATIONS, REINFORCING DEPENDENCE ON THE MOTHER COUNTRY.

GLOBAL TRADE NETWORKS

THE EMERGENCE OF GLOBAL TRADE NETWORKS LINKED EUROPE, AFRICA, THE AMERICAS, AND ASIA IN A COMPLEX WEB OF COMMERCE. KEY COMMODITIES INCLUDED SILVER FROM THE AMERICAS, SPICES AND SILK FROM ASIA, AND SUGAR AND TOBACCO FROM THE NEW WORLD. THESE NETWORKS FACILITATED THE FLOW OF GOODS, CAPITAL, AND LABOR ACROSS CONTINENTS, TRANSFORMING ECONOMIES WORLDWIDE.

THE ATLANTIC SLAVE TRADE AND ITS IMPACT

SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC CONSEQUENCES

THE SLAVE TRADE HAD PROFOUND SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC EFFECTS ON AFRICA AND THE AMERICAS.
